

HIGHLIGHTED COURSES FOR SPRING 2023

ASL 3590- SPECIAL TOPICS ON DEAFHOOD (3 CREDITS)

Come and join this course that will take you a journey into Deaf person's identity through an introduction to the traditional theories of Deaf's culture, sociological traditions, anthropological traditions, and cultural studies that get you to be in a Deaf person's journey.

FR 3500 - SPECIAL TOPICS: HAITIAN ART, HISTORY, RELIGION, AND POLITICS (3 CREDITS)

Along with Haitian history, this class will include discussions and critical points involving art, religion, and politics. The historical relationship between the USA, France, and Haiti will also include reflections on the religion of Vodou with its past and current cultural significance. This class will be taught in English.

GER 2120 - INTERMEDIATE GERMAN (3 CREDITS)

Takes students beyond basic language skills. Utilizing materials, such as music, literature, media, and short films, they will learn to communicate more authentically. They will learn about cuisines typical in certain regions, dialects, and their cultural relevance, as well as traditions.

Prerequisite Ger 2110 or equivalent

HIGHLIGHTED COURSES FOR SPRING 2023

JPNS 1010 -BEGINNING JAPANESE I (5 CREDITS)

This course focuses on the construction and practice of fundamental vocabulary, basic sentence structures and social conventions necessary for simple interpersonal communication in Japanese. The emphasis is on using the Japanese language in everyday situations.

LAT 1010 - BEGINNING LATIN I (4 CREDITS)

This course begins a sequence dealing with the development of the essentials of Latin. Particularly the elements of grammar, reading, and writing.

SPAN 4210/FCS 5210- SPANISH HERITAGE OF COLORADO (3 CREDITS)

A travel course over Spring Break that will take students to visit some of the key areas where Native American, Spanish, and Anglo cultures met in New Mexico and Southern Colorado.

FCS 1020-001 -BEGINNING KOREAN II (5 CREDITS)

This course emphasizes the development of four basic Korean skills (listening, speaking, reading, and writing) in various sociocultural contexts.

Prerequisite FCS 1010-001 or equivalent.
